from mess kit to rifle.

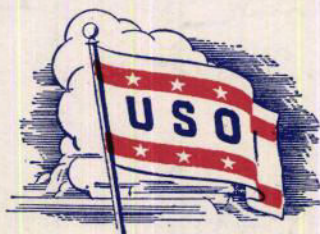
On Saturday after we

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I started writing you a letter then but before I realize it, it was my turn to walk my post. It was a quite evening and I didn't have any excitement while on duty.

While I have the time today there are a few things I'll like to tell you, so I get started on them now.

Your letter of July 6, the one with the heading of "Dearly Beloved" was a lovely letter and it left me with a good feeling. I keep reading it over and over again. When you write a letter like that I find no need to ask you the question that I did on whether you found an interest in any other fellow.



The reason why I asked you the question then must have been because I didn't receive a letter like your letter of July 6 in a long period of time.

I know you must be as deeply in love with me but as I am with you but every so often I like to read about it. Understand?

Darling, I know how confused you must be about my furlough and if you should visit me down here.

I am in the same state of confusing confusion.

Dear I'll repeat as I did before. I think I'll get the furlough because other fellows from other companies are receiving a leave. If I receive a furlough then the other fellows from my class will get the leave at the same time. You see sweet, I won't be able to judge if I'll get the furlough by other fellows in my platoon. We started are training at the same time and we will finish together. I'm judging the furlough by what other groups and what I've been told.



I once told you that you can't tell from one minute to the next what's going to happen in this man's army. If I were you I wouldn't worry from experiences that other fellows had to encounter at other camps. I feel that length of time hasn't much to do in my case of getting a furlough. In fact I think I have a better chance for the simple reason that when I complete my training here it takes time
