Sept 30, 1944

my Beloved Sweetheart,

Tonight I can not write you as I did last Saturday and I believe the Saturday before that, that, today I received one of your Saturday letters. In fact there wasn't any letters from you dear.

Received a package from Mom today, and enclosed was a small can of evaporated milk and a coffee bag which I assumed was coffee within the bag. The boys and I decided to prepare ourselves cups of coffee. Obtained the stove and heated the water, when opening

remained around a good part
of the afternoon. To the fellows
talking to the American girls for
awhile, means more than their
donuts.

Practically all this week my
letters have been long which leaves
me little to add today except
that darling, thinking of those wonderful
Saturday's I spent with you in
the past and oh, how I'll like
those day's to repeat themselves, until
5 0 0 N

As I say good night to the
grandest lady of them all, it's the
same of stay, I love you I
love you more than just words
can express. Pleasant dreams, darling
and sleep well until you hear
from me tomorrow. I am

see that instead of coffee it was
candy. All our efforts in preparation
did not go to waste as we had
some coffee grounds from our 10 in 1
ration and used that. I can't figure
out the reason for mother enclosing
the can of evaporated milk. That's what
had me believing there was coffee in
the coffee bag all awhile without looking
to see if it was so.

Red Cross girls were around
today with their usual donuts and
coffee. These girls acted more
friendly than those back in Italy
because they mingled more with
the fellows in carrying on a
casual conversation. The other girls
appeared only to hand out their
