My Beloved Judy,

Since we came back to our hotel late, last night after seeing a late movie, the four of us slept until ten o'clock in the morning. Then waited around for dinner, and after that took a walk down the main section of town. Stopped off at the PX as we usual do to see if they were selling cigarette lighters, and today we arrived just at the correct time to purchase one. Even though I have a German lighter I bought the PX lighter because it's suppose to be better. I priced a similar lighter in a French store and the ridiculous

price amounted to \$34 dollars,  
I paid two dollars for the  
lighter at the P.T.

This evening honey we are  
going to the G.T. theatre to see a  
French show. Since the theatre is  
for allied troops the price is  
reasonable being only fifty cents  
a seat. It's a new policy of  
the G.T. theatre, instead of  
showing continuous movies, every  
week there is a new stage show  
showing twice daily, one performance  
in the afternoon, and the other  
in the evening. Then at 11:30, look,  
there is the late movie.

Now writing to you from our  
hotel room and to pass the time  
away before going to the theatre,  
the other fellows are playing cards  
and I'll join them after finishing  
this letter to you darling.
